Should I buy a Mac or a PC?

PC in this context refers to any computer running a Windows 7 operating system. An Apple Macintosh (Mac) is a computer manufactured by Apple running a Macintosh X (ten) operating system. I am not including the technologically superior Linux operating systems in this discussion. I believe for most Sun City Summerlin computer users the technical skills required and the limited support for Linux make a PC or Mac a more logical choice.

Quality – Advantage Mac

Today the guts of both platforms are very similar. Both Macs and PCs of machines use Intel processors (although some PCs use AMD processors). Both buy memory, hard drives and graphics cards from the same small number of suppliers. Mac has quality control that is superior to PCs, possibly because Apple controls the production of all Macs, while PCs are made by several different manufacturers who compete with each other on price.

Seller Support – Advantage Mac

Mac is famous for the support it provides end users. At the time of your initial purchase, Apple provides excellent support; via telephone or face to face at one of the three Apple Stores in Las Vegas. You can buy an extended warranty for Windows PCs for \$200 to \$400 for three years of parts and labor. Apple's extended warranty, for three years parts and labor plus outstanding phone support and Genius Bar service, costs \$249.

Vulnerability to Viruses – Advantage Mac

Macs are less likely to be infected with a virus than a PC. This is not because the Mac has a more secure operating system. Mac's make up such a small percentage of the market (8%) in comparison to Windows (88%) that it is much less worthwhile to write a virus for Macs.

System Stability – Advantage Mac

Apple's software engineers are only required to address Mac software, and they pretty much know what hardware their software will run on. While Windows 7 represents a new high in stability, the much more varied hardware and software must be supported will always tend to decrease Windows' stability.

Cost – Advantage PC

Windows computers are considerably less expensive (it is fair to say "cheaper"). A Mac costs almost twice as much as a PC in each model's basic configurations. This is because several competing manufacturers (Dell, HP, Acer, Toshiba, etc.) produce PCs and only Apple produces Macs. The price differential for Mac and PC narrows in the \$1000+ price range.

Repairs, Upgrades, and non-seller support – Advantage PC

PC users have a decided advantage when it comes to upgrading or making out-of-warranty repairs to their systems. Most computer technicians, including most of those working at the Sun City Summerlin Computer Club, are experienced with PCs, not Macs. More advanced PC users love the ability to build and upgrade their own computers. This allows them to make truly customized systems. Macs can be upgraded, but the process is generally simpler and less expensive with a PC. With a Mac, you will likely have to return your computer to an Apple store, or mail in to Apple for a repair or upgrade. Parts and repairs for Macs are more expensive than for PCs. Because so many companies make parts for PCs, the competition keeps prices down.

Availability of software – advantage PC

Like PC hardware, software for PC is much more plentiful, varied, and often less expensive. Some software for PCs known as Freeware or Shareware can be downloaded from the Internet at no cost. You can find software to satisfy most needs for either OS.

Gaming – advantage PC

Because of the much larger market, there many more games available for PC users. Solitaire is included with the operating system for Windows but not Macs. That would be a deal killer for many users, but not to worry; it is available as a free download for Macs.

Operating System ease of use – advantage neither

Mac users will disagree with this point but for better or worse we live in a Windows based world. The operating systems have distinctly different looks and feels, but in terms of functionality, Microsoft Windows 7 and Mac OS X Leopard have very similar built-in multimedia, email, Internet and productivity applications. If an individual has no computer experience, the Mac would definitely be easier to learn. If a user has had prior experience with either system, Mac or PC, it would be easiest to stick with that system.



How to Get Help on the Web?

For the past twenty-five years, my friend Paul has either built or modified my desktop computers. Whenever I would have a problem, I would call Paul and he would try to solve it. A few years ago, while he was “solving” one of my problems, I heard the clatter of a keyboard and I asked him, “What are you doing?” He responded, “I’m asking Google the question you asked me!”

Since then, instead of calling Paul twice a week, I call him about once a month and solve my own problems by asking Google! If you have any questions, type in “Google.com” and type in your question. Within seconds, pages of articles either discussing your problem or providing you with the solution will appear. It saves lots of stress! Now there are many solutions for people who dabble in Digital Photography on the web.

One of my students recently sent me this link: http://www.lexar.com/dp/tips_lessons/index.html

This is a series of tips and lessons pertaining to Digital Photography. This website is sponsored by Lexar, one of the leading producers of flash memory cards, so many of the pages will have ads, but the information is useful and helpful.

Another website, sent to me by the same student is: <http://www.shortcourses.com/index.htm>
This offers complete “small” courses on various topics in Digital Photography. As with the first, there are commercial ads on each page so consider this when you go to this site!

A third is <http://www.digicamhelp.com/index.php>
And consider the same caveats for this website!

A fourth website is http://malektips.com/digital_photography_help_and_tips.html
As with the others, consider the source!

Besides offering assistance, there are a few websites which provide help in editing images. Most of them ask you to “join” and many of them are still FREE! They work like simple photo-editing programs, but they are “web-based” which means you have to upload your photos to the site and do your editing at the site. This also means you have to be connected to the Internet to do this editing. WHY should you use these services when you can use Picasa or other programs on your computer without being connected to the web? The answer is that some of them allow you to do more sophisticated “edits” than Picasa or similar programs and then you can order prints (which is really the ulterior motive for most of these services).

There are many others.
