Constitution and Bylaws Revisions Notice: The SCSCC Board has recommended the following changes to the Club's constitution and bylaws. These changes will be voted on at the December meeting.

Constitution:

SECTION III.3

Dues shall be \$15.00 \$10.00 per calendar year and may be pro-rated. Annual dues may be increased to an amount not to exceed \$50 per year by a majority vote of the membership at a business meeting of the club. The SCSCAI must approve amounts exceeding \$50 per year.

SCSCC Bylaws:

3.3 Club Dues are \$20.00 \$10.00 per member per year, payable on or before January 1st of each year. Dues for a new membership commencing after July 1st and prior to December 31st shall be one-half of the annual amount for such partial year. The Board of Directors may establish a reduced dues rate for additional individuals living in the same household as the first member. To promote timely renewals, the Board of Directors may establish an "early bird" discount rate incentive.

Repair or Replace It?

ConsumerReports magazine's August 2011 issue included an article discussing whether it was more cost efficient to repair or replace various household items. The analysis was based on data provided by 27,000 subscribers and their experiences with 53,000 broken items ranging from refrigerators to electronics to exercise equipment.

Of course I was particularly interested in the data relating to personal computers, both desktops and laptops/notebooks. ConsumerReports concluded that when either type of computer was over 4 years old, it was more cost effective to replace the computer than to have it repaired.

The article stated that the average cost of a computer repair was \$164, and consumers were more likely to feel that a computer repair had been done badly than repairs to other household items.

I think the findings would have been very different if the survey had been conducted among Sun City Summerlin Computer Club members. Our Computer Club hardware Techs often successfully repair computers, especially desktops, that are over 4 years old. Of course labor is free if computers are brought into the Tuesday afternoon Hardware SIG, or done at a nominal charge if the work is done in the club member's home.

Computer Club Techs are often able to provide required parts at no charge using pieces we are able to salvage from donated computers. If parts have to be purchased, we are usually able to provide them at a substantial savings compared to prices charged by retailers.

Members should still be realistic about the lifespan of their computers. Any laptop older than 5 years or tower older than 6 years is likely living on borrowed time. I'm not saying that a computer should be pitched (or donated to the Club for parts) after 5 or 6 years; I have seen machines still *functioning* after 8 or 10 years. Older computers are just slower, more frustrating to use (i.e. programs not responding errors), and more subject to malware attacks and data loss than newer machines.

There is always some learning required when switching to a new PC, which today will come with the excellent Windows 7 operating system. But our Computer Club Techs and classes will help you make the transition with a minimum of heartburn.

Arguably the most valuable service Computer Club Techs are able to provide to our members is objective advice. We have no motivation to try to sell you a new computer or to convince you to do a repair or upgrade on an older computer that is not in your best interest.

Digital Photography?

Everyone around you is buying a digital camera. Is it time for YOU to join the club? There are many things to consider;

- 1. What are you going to use the camera for?
- 2. What type of computer do you have?
- 3. How much money do you want to spend?

The last question is the easiest to answer since you can spend anywhere from \$100 to \$3000!

If you don't have a computer, then you probably shouldn't buy a digital camera! I've often said, "A digital camera without a computer is like a boat without water!" If you're going to take snapshots (with a digital camera) and then bring them to Wal-mart, COSTCO or someplace else to do the processing, than you might as well spend just \$4 and buy a disposal camera!

The main advantage of digital photography is to do your own editing – fixing up the picture. You can make a bad picture good and you can make a good picture better! If you don't want to edit your "pics," it doesn't pay to have a digital camera.

Another advantage of digital photography is immediate gratification – you see your pictures instantly in the LCD (screen) and enjoy them right away. However, if you don't want to edit them, you might as well buy a cheap Polaroid!

Finally, if you're going to take photos of pets, babies or sporting events, then most digital cameras under \$500 will only frustrate you because of "shutter lag." This is the 1/3 to ½ of a second it often takes for all this technology to "snap" a photo. Moving objects don't stay in one place! In other words, what you see is NOT what you get!

Then WHY buy a digital camera?

- 1.YOU are now in control and can change the whole photo or part of the photo. You can make objects clearer, draw attention to one specific object in the photo, or change the color of either all or parts of the photo!
- 2.A digital camera, in the long run, is more economical. Prices of the actual cameras have come way down, and you never have to buy film because you can use the memory flash cards over and over again! Also, when you shoot a roll of 24 or 36 pictures, you have to pay to have all of them developed and printed. With digital photography, you only print the photos that you want!
- 3.Immediate gratification is enjoyable! It's fun for you and the people in the photo to see the results immediately!
- 4. You feel younger because you are "in touch" with new technology!
- 5. You never "show" a bad picture! You shoot all the photos you want and "delete" the bad ones people think you're a great photographer!

Digital Photography is a great, new and exciting hobby. However, if you don't want to put in any effort (working with the photos on the computer) you're better off staying with film.
