

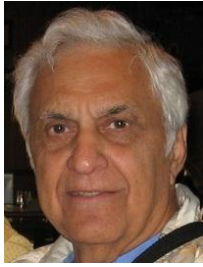

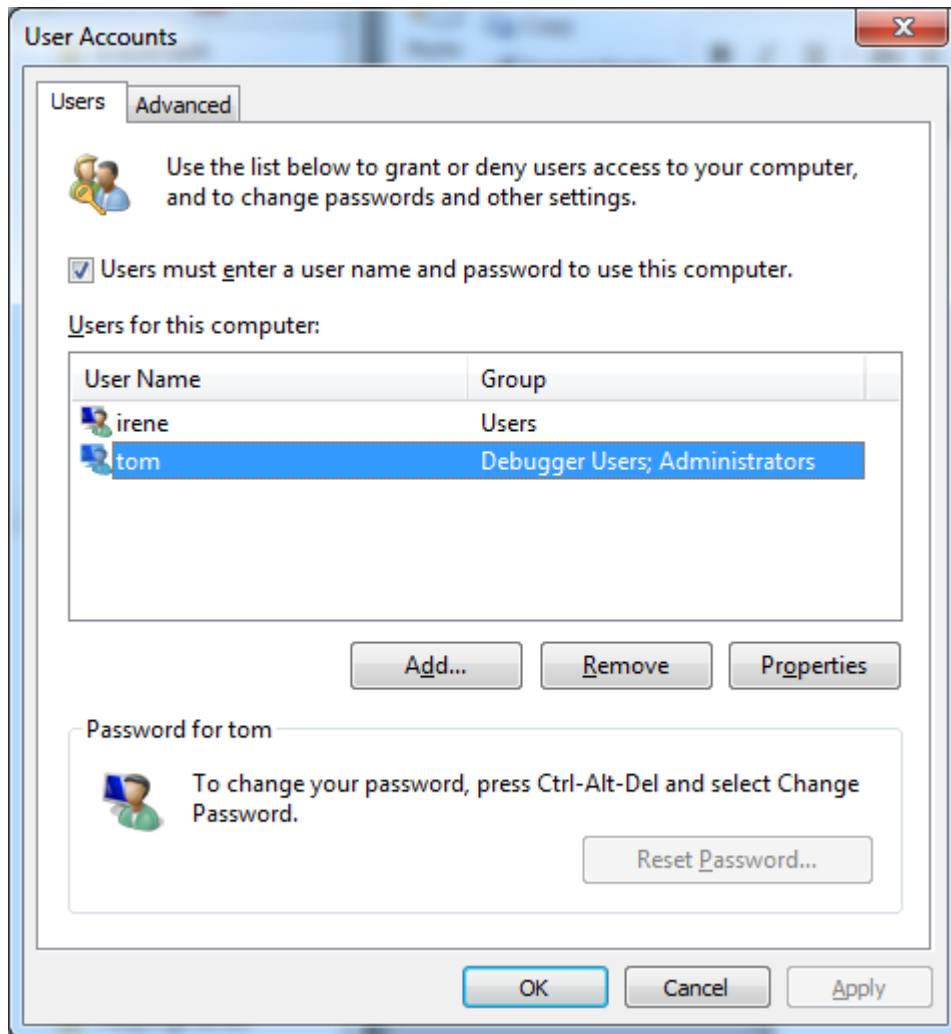

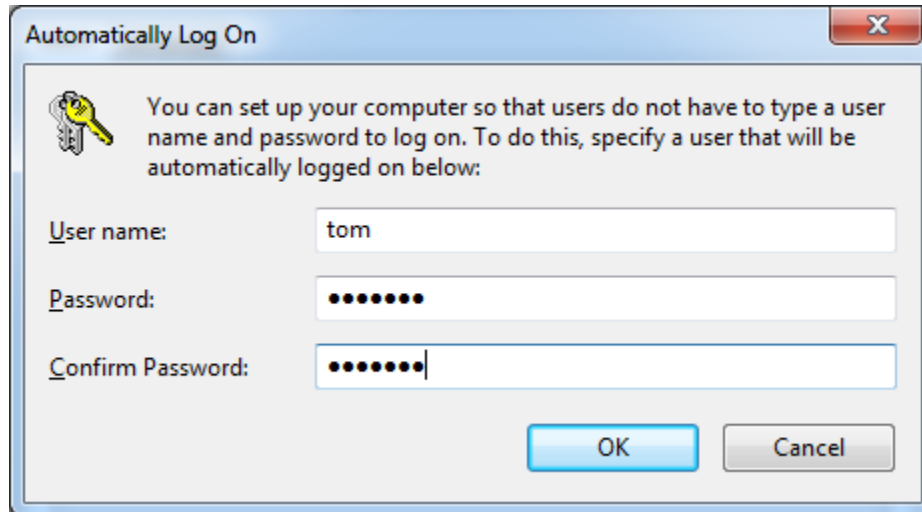
Automating Windows Your PC’s Login

Here’s a useful security-related tip that applies to Windows 7, Windows Vista and maybe Windows XP. If you have multiple user accounts defined on one PC, or even just one user account that has an associated password, Windows makes you login every time you boot your PC. You can use the network policy wizard tool to set up an automatic login for one account.

Click the Start orb in the lower left corner of the desktop, enter “netplwiz” into the Search window and press Enter. Netplwiz.exe will start and display the following window:



Click to select the user who will be automatically logged in (“tom” in the above screen. Then *uncheck* the box labeled “Users must enter a user name and password to use this computer. Then click the Apply button. The following password dialog will appear:



Type in the password (twice) for the selected user, and then click OK.

Finally, click OK in the earlier dialog.

Now when you boot your PC, the specified user account will be automatically logged in. This is very nice early in the morning. You can start the PC and then leave it to boot up and log in while you go make the coffee or get the paper. When you come back, everything is ready to go.

I use this on all my home Windows PCs. I do put a password on all my user accounts to help ward off hackers.

Boot Camp Course Description:

Boot Camp is an introductory course designed for members who are new to computing and/or the Microsoft Windows operating system. It also serves as an excellent review for intermediate users who want to fill some gaps in their computer knowledge.

This hands-on class has a limited enrollment of 12 with each participant working at an individual computer station in the Computer Lab. A multi-member team of lead instructor and four coaches will provide step-by-step instruction that will include demonstrations, guided practice and individual coaching assistance.

Participants will be introduced to the basic vocabulary and concepts necessary to establish an understanding of Windows. They will be instructed in practical techniques for managing and organizing their own data files, will be introduced to important strategies for working successfully with word processing documents, email, and the Internet, and will learn how to read and write data from and to a compact disk and a portable flash drive. Those participants who own a digital camera will actively participate in a demonstration on copying photos from a camera to their hard drive, utilizing their newly acquired skills of file management.

Digital Photography Column

Picasa

In 2004, Google issued an IPO (Initial Public offering) which raised \$2.5 Billion with which they bought some new “toys” to expand their empire. They bought an email program (which we now know as Gmail), a Global Positioning Program (which we now know as Google Earth), a mapping program (which we now know as Google Maps and has been incorporated into Google Earth), and a photo editing and organizing program which was, and still is, called **Picasa**! Often confused with the renowned artist [Pablo] Picasso, **Picasa** was given its name because it took photos (pic) and gave them a place on your computer (casa).

In twelve years of being involved with Digital Photography, I have found Picasa to be the cheapest - it's FREE at: <http://picasa.google.com/> - and the EASIEST of all the photo editing programs available. It's virtually IMPOSSIBLE to make a mistake with **Picasa** since nothing is ever final until it is saved. In my classes (500 in just over nine years) I always refer to it as “the training wheels of Digital Photography”. Whether I give formal classes or private lessons, I always suggest to my students that they use **Picasa** BEFORE they even install the software that comes with their new digital cameras.

When **Picasa** is first opened on your computer, it will search, find and organize all photos on your hard drive. It will show them (on the main screen) as folders, and when you click on any of the folders, all the pictures in that folder will be represented by thumbnails on the right two-thirds of the screen. If you click on any one photo, you enter the “Edit” mode, which changes the screen appearance so that the five basic Edit Menus appear on the left third of the screen and the photo takes up the right two-thirds. From this point you can try the various choices available in the Edit Menus.

However, you can do so many other things with **Picasa**! If you check the photos into the bottom left corner, they are now in your Work Tray. From the Work Tray you can email the photos to friends, order prints from almost any service or store (except Costco), print the photos in a variety of layouts, make a slideshow, or a movie, or do so much else! When I do my classes on **Picasa** I often feel like I'm selling a Swiss Army Knife because it can do so much and, remember, it's FREE!

There is so much to learn about **Picasa** that we created a **Picasa** SIG (Special Interest Group) which is held the third Monday of every month that I am here (October to April) at 1pm in the Computer Classroom. I hope to see you there, soon!

Kretchmar's Korner

Free Email Providers

(This “best of” column first ran in February, 2011)

There are three major free email providers available today, Yahoo Mail by Yahoo, Hotmail by Microsoft, and Gmail by Google. There is no free lunch – free email providers are supported by ads, but these are not obtrusive.

AOL email ruled the email roost in the 1990s, but is currently in fourth place among free email providers, and fading fast. AOL email accounts are Spam magnets; not the tasty (?) tinned meat product but garbage e-mail. AOL has lagged competitors in Spam filtering technology, as well as organizing.

I maintain email accounts with all of the “Big Three” providers. All 3 providers provide plenty on online storage. Which email provider is best? Like the answer to so many computer related questions, it depends.

Yahoo Mail is currently the largest (in number of users) in the United States, with twice as many visitors as Hotmail and Gmail combined. However it is losing market share. If you use Yahoo as a homepage Yahoo mail is a natural choice. It is easy to use and is the most established of the free providers.

Hotmail, sponsored by Microsoft, is seamlessly integrated with (or morphing into) Windows Live, an excellent free storage and sharing point for pictures and short videos, among other features. Windows Live Mail provides a relatively smooth transfer from Outlook Express, which was discontinued with Vista.

Gmail from Google is the smallest but fastest growing email provider. Gmail owns the “cool” factor. Gmail is integrated with Google applications, and its new features are constantly being added. Google has also recently introduced an excellent browser, Google Chrome, that is slicker than any Internet browser has a right to be.

Cox and CenturyLink, as well as being Summerlin’s principal Internet Service Providers (ISP) also provide email service at no additional charge. You can directly use their email services or link Microsoft Outlook or Outlook Express to the Cox or CenturyLink mail servers.

The most obvious disadvantage in using ISP based email accounts is if you change ISPs, you must transfer your account. Also these providers can change names, i.e. Embarq/CenturyLink, which might someday require an account change. It is also a little more difficult to access ISP based mail account from a different computer, such as one you might use in an Internet Café.
