

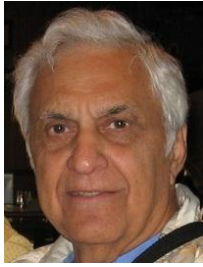

Boot Camp Course Description:

Boot Camp is an introductory course designed for members who are new to computing and/or the Microsoft Windows operating system. It also serves as an excellent review for intermediate users who want to fill some gaps in their computer knowledge.

This hands-on class has a limited enrollment of 12 with each participant working at an individual computer station in the Computer Lab. A multi-member team of lead instructor and four coaches will provide step-by-step instruction that will include demonstrations, guided practice and individual coaching assistance.

Participants will be introduced to the basic vocabulary and concepts necessary to establish an understanding of Windows. They will be instructed in practical techniques for managing and organizing their own data files, will be introduced to important strategies for working successfully with word processing documents, email, and the Internet, and will learn how to read and write data from and to a compact disk and a portable flash drive. Those participants who own a digital camera will actively participate in a demonstration on copying photos from a camera to their hard drive, utilizing their newly acquired skills of file management.

Digital Photography Column

Picasa Workflow

Workflow is defined as the most efficient way to accomplish a process – from beginning to end. In our Picasa SIG, I demonstrated the workflow system I use when editing a group of photos.

1. Loading photos – There are many ways to load (or transfer) photos from your camera to your computer. I found, that when you open up Picasa, you go to the IMPORT button, and, if your camera is attached or if you have inserted the memory card, the pictures will appear on the page. Down at the bottom there will be a blank line that says “folder title” You can type in whatever you feel appropriate, but I have found that just typing in the DATE is the easiest and most efficient. When you are finished, click on the “Select All” button. Your screen will revert back to the “Folder” mode and your folder (and the included photos) will appear.

2. Batch Edit – Batch editing is doing an action on an entire group of pictures. The most common function is to “Enhance” all the photos which is to make them their optimum contrast and brightness. This can be done “Right clicking” anywhere in the Folder and choosing “Select All Photos”! You will notice that all of the pictures in the photo are now highlighted in Blue and you can then select an action by going to PICTURE, “Batch Edit” and (I usually) select “I’m feeling Lucky” – Picasa’s command to “Enhance” Within moments, all of the pictures in the folder are now at their best contrast and color.

3. Edit Photos – by clicking on anyone photo, you can then Crop, Highlight, Change the Color or about thirty other choices. Each photo must be done individually.

4. Save a Copy - When you are finished and want to select a particular photo for your final group (to slideshow, email, print, etc.) you click on FILE and choose “Save a Copy”. “Save a Copy” makes a copy of the edited photo and ALWAYS places it at the end of the folder. If you “Save” it overwrites the original, and if you “save As” it saves the photo with a different name. The main advantage to “Save a Copy” is that when you are finished working on all your photos, you will have your “Copies” at the end of the folder together in one group. This makes selecting them for email, printing, etc. easier because they will be all together.

5. Email or Print – With your finished photos at the end of the folder, just put them in the work tray (lower left hand corner of the screen), “lock” them in (green mark) and print, email, or make a gift CD!

Using this system makes Picasa an easy and very organized program. Enjoy.

Kretchmar's Korner

How do I get rid of an old computer?

You've gotten a brand new computer and have copied all of your data (documents, pictures, Contacts, Favorites, Bookmarks, etc.) from your old system. You've found that no one (even at the Hardware SIG!) wants your old machine.

The environmentally friendly thing to do is drop off your old machine at the Goodwill truck at the SE corner of Cheyenne & Tenaya, in the hospital/medical building parking lot. Goodwill also has a drop-off point at Washington and Buffalo, at the West corner of Lowe's. I particularly mention Goodwill because they, in partnership with Dell, have a policy of not exporting unusable electronics for processing to third world countries, but recycling and processing the material in the US.

What about my data?

Naturally a computer you've used for years potentially contains a lot of sensitive personal information. And even if you have deleted files, data might still be recoverable.

On most desktop computers the only data - including your personal files - saved on the machine is written to your hard drive. This information is retained, of course, even after you turn your computer off.

A hard drive of a computer being discarded should be wiped or physically damaged so that if anyone wanted to get your information off of your old computer, data retrieval would be very difficult and expensive, if not impossible.

If your computer is still functioning, we can run disk cleaning software on it at the Hardware SIG on Tuesday afternoon. You can wipe off your hard drive yourself if you are familiar with the diskpart utility program that is built into the Windows operating system (click on Start, type diskpart).

If you want to tackle the job yourself you will likely need a Phillips screwdriver to open your tower and remove the hard drive. Your hard drive in a desktop is a rectangular piece of metal; (approx. 3 ½ inches wide, 1 inch tall, 6 inches long) screwed in or otherwise mounted near the front of your tower. Generally you will have to remove the side of your tower to access the hard drive.

The hard drive can be removed and kept until you are certain you have moved all of the files you needed. Then the disk can be wiped, or if it is very old or poorly functioning, can be hit on the bottom a few times with a hammer to permanently disable it.
