



Help Your Lost Flash Drive to Get Returned

It happens to all of us. Your flash drive falls out of your pocket when you take out your wallet, or you forget to remove it from a PC in the SCSCC lab, or maybe you leave it on a table at the library. Losing a flash drive can be an inconvenience to an outright disaster - especially if you had sensitive data stored there, or perhaps your only copy of something irreplaceable, like family photos.

Here are some simple things a Windows user can do to make it easier for an ethical person who finds your flash drive to return it to you.

1. After you have inserted your flash drive into a USB socket and Windows has "mounted" the flash drive and assigned it a drive letter, go to Computer or My Computer, right click on the drive letter for the flash drive and select "Properties". This will open a dialog window that will allow you to edit the flash drive's internal *Label*.



Click in the label window and type in a label that identifies you.

Now, when the person who finds your lost flash drive inserts it into a USB socket, your identifyig label will be displayed. This is especially good if you "lose" the drive at the Computer Club facilities, where you'll likely be known.

- 2. Cut down a blank address address label, print just your name on it and stick it onto the flash drive. Then tape over that label so it wont peel off. Pre-printed address labels can work also, but cut away your address and leave just your name.
- 3. Use Notepad.exe to create a small text file on the flash drive with some basic contact information, such as your name, phone number and e-mail address (*do not include your home address too risky*). Save this text file as "Owner.txt" in a folder named: "AAOwner". This folder name will sort near the top of the list of folders, so it will be easy to spot by someone who finds your drive, inserts it into a USB socket, and scans the contents to see who the owner might be. This is effective if you accidentally lose the flash drive at a more public location.
- 4. After doing step 2 above, you can also use Notepad.exe to create an Autorun.inf text file in the root folder of the flash drive. The contents of the Autorun.inf file should be a single line:

open=notepad.exe \AAOwner\Owner.txt

As an anti-virus measure, Windows 7 completely disables the "autorun" feature. However, Windows XP and Windows Vista still support it, but prompt the user before running the command in the Autorun.inf file.

With the Autorun.inf file, when the flash drive is inserted into a USB socket on a Windows Vista or XP computer, your contact information text file will automatically be displayed.

Steps 1, 2 and 3 should translate well to the Macintosh ecosphere, but I'm not sure of the specific steps.

Digital Photography Column

Photo Storage

Storing photo files is relatively easy – they just take up space. Most photo files default to a .jpg format which is the industry standard. They can range anywhere from 250 kilobytes to 5 or more megabytes, depending upon the size and power of the sensor in your digital camera. The more megapixels your camera uses, the larger the .jpg file will be.

Some of you may ask, "Why would I want to save a photo file?" It could be a memorable photo or of a memorable event, or you could be like me, and save EVERY picture you have ever taken (almost). The .jpg files can be stored on your hard drive, a CD, a thumb drive, or an external hard drive. You should save, at least, the important or most memorable files because our lives are based on memories.

I choose to save all my photos because my philosophy is "maybe someday they'll develop software which will allow me to make this photo better!" This situation actually has me remembered in Clark County history – TRUE STORY!

In October of 2009, I took someone down to Hoover Dam and took a photo of the dam, the lake and the intake towers. (Bottom photo below)


After processing the photo and examining it, I thought it looked familiar. I looked back in my files (in NY), which are sorted by year and then sub sorted by event (travel, grandchildren, etc.) I found virtually the same exact picture from 1999, only there were 100 more feet of water in the lake! (Top photo below)

When I got back to Sun City, I made a collage of the two photos – one from 1999 and one from 2009. I captured a "moment in time" – the same place but ten years apart. I emailed the collage to the, then, Manager of the Clark County Commission, Virginia Valentine, on Sunday, Dec 6 at 9am and asked her, "Do you guys realize what is going on down at the dam?" She replied by 3pm that afternoon and said, "We are well aware of it, and someone from Public Relations will call you tomorrow morning!"

The next morning, the public relations person from the Clark County Commission called me and said, "Mr. Gershon, everyone has seen your photo and we would like to put it in our 100 year time capsule!"

I was shocked, so I answered, "When?" He replied, "Tomorrow at 11am! Be here!" I said "Thank you!" I went to Office Depot, had a great copy of the print made and put in a plastic folder with my name and address on the back.

The next morning, Dec 8, I stood in front of the County Office building with all the dignitaries and celebrities and watched my photo, along with other memorabilia of the time, be buried in the capsule and scheduled to be reopened on the same date in 2109!

This is not why I save all my photos, but it was fortunate circumstance and the timing was perfect! You know where I'll be in 97 years!

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Kretchmar's Korner

Microsoft Security Essentials

(This article first appeared in December, 2010)

Microsoft has a security suite, Microsoft Security Essentials (MSE) currently available at no cost from the Microsoft website: http://www.microsoft.com/security_essentials/. MSE is available in both 32 and 64 bit versions for all current Windows operating systems.

The download should be made *only* from the Microsoft website. Malware is being introduced into computers from sites that appear to be sponsored by Microsoft. Any existing anti-virus software should be removed from your computer before installing MSE.

MSE is an excellent free security suite that many hardware technicians in the SCSCC believe is superior to other free or paid for security suites available today. MSE takes up minimal space on your computer, and performs its scans quickly. MSE runs in the background to protect you whenever your computer is on, and you can configure MSE to scan your computer automatically daily or weekly.

MSE does all of the things (and much more) previously done by Windows Defender. If you are running MSE you do not need to also run Windows Defender. The MSE installer disables Windows Defender on Vista and Windows 7 and uninstalls it from XP. However sometimes this does not happen automatically.

If the MSE installer did *not* automatically disable Windows Defender on Vista or Windows 7, you should manually *disable* it to prevent conflicts. Windows Defender cannot be uninstalled from Vista or Windows 7.

If the MSE installer did *not* automatically uninstall Windows Defender on XP, you should manually *uninstall* Windows Defender via Control Panel/Add or Remove Programs.
