Digital Media SIG Retires Internet Investing SIG Launches

The Digital Music SIG, which later evolved to be the Digital Media SIG, was launched in 2002. There’s a large archive of handouts in the SIGs area covering a broad spectrum of topics. The sessions were enjoyable for me, as I have a deep interest in computer-based music, video and images. However, after 11 years, the SIG had pretty much run its course. Attendance was dropping and there just wasn’t much new to cover. Further, the media industry has evolved. It’s become routine to get all your music and videos via low cost Internet subscription services that allow you to download and stream content to your PC or handheld device. The playback quality of this Internet content is excellent and the selection is extraordinary. Consequently, much of the original reason for the SIG had become obsolete. As a result, I decided to retire the Digital Media SIG as of September, 2013. From time to time, I still will do seminars relating to digital media, probably more focused on digital video than music.

Beginning in October, I plan to launch a new SIG, which we’ll call the Internet Investing SIG. Similar to my twice-yearly seminars on Internet Investment Resources, the SIG will focus on helping our members use the vast financial information resources and tools of the Internet to have greater success in managing their investment portfolios. Like all SIGs, the Internet Investing SIG will provide a forum for interested club members to share information, ask questions and learn. The meeting format will include a round-the-room Q&A session and a topical presentation. The SIG’s target audience will be members with moderate computer and investing experience, but ALL club members are welcome.

Currently, I expect the Internet Investing SIG to meet every other “even” month on the third Thursday morning at 9 AM. The alternate “odd” months, I plan to use the same time slot for presenting seminars on other topics. We’ll see how that works for about 6 months and then adjust as needed.

I’ll look forward to seeing you at the new Internet Investing SIG, Thursday, October 17th at 9 AM.

Boot Camp Course Description:

Boot Camp is an introductory course designed for residents who are new to computing and/or the Microsoft Windows operating system. **It also serves as an excellent review for intermediate users who want to fill some gaps in their computer knowledge.**

This hands-on class has a **limited enrollment of 12** with each participant working at an individual computer station in the Computer Lab. A multi-member team of lead instructor and three coaches will provide step-by-step instruction that will include demonstrations, guided practice and individual coaching assistance.

Participants will be introduced to the basic vocabulary and concepts necessary to establish an understanding of Windows. They will be instructed in practical techniques for managing and organizing their own data files, will be introduced to important strategies for working successfully with word processing documents, email, and the Internet, and will learn how to read and write data from and to a portable flash drive. Those participants who own a digital camera will be invited to actively participate in a hands-on experience of copying photos from their camera to their provided thumb drive, utilizing their newly acquired skills of file management.

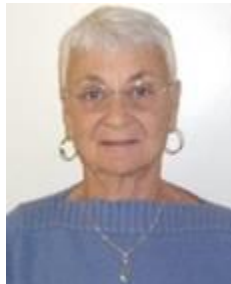

Digital Photography Column

Photo Editing Software

There are many photo editing programs. There are the programs which come with your new digital camera or all-in one printer. There is the program included in the basic functions in Windows Media Center. There are programs which you can buy at a store like Target or Fry's. However, at our Computer Club, we have regular classes in the three most prominent programs that are available and they are included in our SIG's – Special Interest Groups.

I will start with the most basic program available. **Picasa**. Picasa is a basic program which is available FREE from Google at <http://picasa.google.com/index.html>

Picasa is the easiest of the programs to use (there are only about fifty choices to select from which makes it easier to make decisions on what to do). The most basic functions, Crop (to change the size and shape of the photo) and Enhance (to make it brighter or control contrast and color) are on the basic menu. Since the program is FREE, Google calls the Enhance button ("I'm Feeling Lucky") which is Google's signature phrase from its search engine. The choices in the newest version (v 3.9) are included in five different drop-down menus. The most important thing to remember about Picasa is that unless you SAVE your changes, they are NOT permanent and will not be there unless you do save them! I conduct a regular **Picasa SIG** once a month for the six months I am here.

If you think you have mastered Picasa or want to explore a more advanced program, the best (of many) is **Adobe Photoshop Elements**. This program has many more menus, does more extensive changes, and is much more complex to operate, yet, it will provide you with many more enhancements and allows you to select only parts of your photo with its extensive Selection tools. The newest version (v. 10) was released in December and many of our members purchased it from COSTCO which made a SPECIAL EDITION AVAILABLE FOR ONLY \$50! It is usually available for about \$100 with two licenses. Elements is much more difficult to operate (we just started a class in Elements last month which, I hope, will evolve into a regular **Elements SIG** in the coming months). Whereas Picasa only gives you about fifty choices in editing changes to select from, Elements provides you with over two hundred opportunities to make changes in your photos. Therefore, Elements is far more complex, yet can provide you with a much more rewarding final product!

Finally, there is **Adobe Photoshop CS** (Creative Suite) which is the most complex and the most expensive (costing anywhere from \$300 to \$800 depending upon which edition you buy). There are thousands of editing choices and add-ons which can make your edited photo look like a professional! As a matter of fact, most professional photographers use Photoshop CS and there are numerous courses and magazines available for consumers dedicated to Photoshop CS. Our Computer Club has a regular **Photoshop SIG** that meets once a month.

All our photo editing groups meet on a monthly basis and you should always check our Monthly Calendar at <http://www.scs-cc.com/>.

iPad News and Tips

IOS 7

The new Apple IOS 7 operating system for iPads and iPhones has been out for a few weeks now. Presumably, many of you have downloaded it. If you haven't, you should, even if you don't like what you have heard about it.

There are a couple of reasons to do this, and the first is that every new upgrade has its critics, and too often these are people who don't particularly like anything about Apple products. The second reason is that new apps will be designed especially for this system, and although you will be able to download them, they may not work quite as well with an older system.

I have just finished downloading the IOS 7 operating system. It was very quick, about 20 minutes, and painless. I have been out of town, so have only been reading about IOS 7. One of the criticisms I have read often is the appearance. They have given all the Apple apps icons a flat look, with muted colors. I will miss the old icons. But I'm sure I will get used to these. I haven't explored that other features yet, but will do so and then report on them in another column, as well as give a review of the new iPhones.

Kretchmar's Korner

Should I Use a Free Registry Cleaner to speed up my PC?

A poster to HelpingHandsOnline recently asked if he should use CCleaner to speed up his system.

I would suggest NOT using CCleaner or any of the other "free" utilities that are supposed to "fix" your computer.

Cleanmgr, which has been built into all Windows operating systems since XP, does essentially what CCleaner does except it does not clean your registry.

You can access Cleanmgr in XP by clicking on Start/Run and typing Cleanmgr, in Vista or Windows 7 by typing Cleanmgr in the search box, and in Windows 8 by typing the command in the tiles screen.

CCleaner, in my experience, is somewhat more aggressive than Cleanmgr, but unless you know exactly what you are doing CCleaner has the potential to cause much more aggravation than it is worth (or what you pay, which is \$0).

Note that CCleaner can wipe out all of your Cookies and Temporary Internet Files. These files can make your computer easier to use. For example, some sites allow your computer to remember your log on, and some sites even allow you to opt for your computer to remember both your log on and password. This information is often contained in your Cookies and Temporary Internet Files. Temporary Internet Files also contain parts of a web site that are loaded whenever you visit that site, allowing you to use your bandwidth to download new information, such as stock quotes.

Yes, CCleaner or another registry cleaner can "clean" your registry, but you should first ask yourself which registry entries might be problematic. If you know that then why not correct them manually?

Most Registry entries are properly created indirectly, such as when a program is installed or a change is made in your control panel or your personal settings.

No registry cleaner I've seen "knows" which entries might be a problem, let alone how to correct them. These cleaners are more likely to corrupt valuable entries than fix bad ones.

In the Tuesday Hardware SIG we often see broken shortcuts and systems that don't work right, and I suspect that some of these problems are caused by registry cleaners.

Your registry has hundreds or thousands of entries that mean absolutely nothing, and these do nothing to slow down your computer - they are simply ignored.
