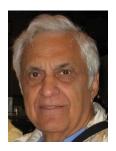

Beware of Unwanted Software Installs

Recently, at the Tuesday morning Kaffee Klatch, we had a discussion about unwanted installs of various tool bars and other browser add-ins, other ad-ware and even mal-ware that gets automatically and covertly installed when you download and install various "free" software applications or utilities.

More and more, to realize income from these free downloads, the services or vendors that provide them are setting up their installation packages to offer (unless you opt out) to install other software packages at the same time. Many of these extra software items aggressively take over your settings and become a major source of irritation. Some can be outright malicious.

Common cases of this are Adobe offering to install tool bars when you update the Adobe Reader or Flash Player. C-Net's Download.com site offers a variety of pieces of software when you download any of its "free" software. The "Ask toolbar" is a common example. If installed, it not only adds the Ask search toolbar, but also hijacks the default home page in all of your browsers. Others can be even worse and in some cases, very difficult to remove.

So what should you do?

First, consider whether this so-called "free" software is worth the possible cost in post-installation grief. If so, do a few things before and during the install:

- 1. Create a System Restore point before doing the install. This will help if you need to back out unwanted installs later.
- 2. If possible, make a backup image / clone of your boot drive.
- 3. During the install, always avoid the "quick" / "easy" / "automatic" / "default" option. Instead, choose the "custom" install. It will let you choose to opt out of any secondary installs (assuming the software provider is ethical). If you don't see a "custom" install option, you should probably avoid installing that software.
- 4. As you proceed through the installation, read each screen carefully and scroll all the way to the bottom. Often, the opt-out checkboxes or buttons are tucked away where they can be hard to see. Make sure you uncheck any checkboxes for optional installs and click any "decline" buttons.

Even after all that caution, if you are a frequent "freebie" acquirer, you may wind up with something unwanted. Often, you can go to the Control Panel's Add/Remove programs and remove the offending software there. Within the web browsers, you can usually disable add-ins under the Tools interface.

Remember, in the words of sci-fi writer Robert Heinlein, "TANSTAAFL"!

Boot Camp Course Description:

Boot Camp is an introductory course designed for residents who are new to computing and/or the Microsoft Windows operating system. It also serves as an excellent review for intermediate users who want to fill some gaps in their computer knowledge.

This hands-on class has a **limited enrollment of 12** with each participant working at an individual computer station in the Computer Lab. A multi-member team of lead instructor and three coaches will provide step-by-step instruction that will include demonstrations, guided practice and individual coaching assistance.

Participants will be introduced to the basic vocabulary and concepts necessary to establish an understanding of Windows. They will be instructed in practical techniques for managing and organizing their own data files, will be introduced to important strategies for working successfully with word processing documents, email, and the Internet, and will learn how to read and write data from and to a portable flash drive. Those participants who own a digital camera will be invited to actively participate in a hands-on experience of copying photos from their camera to their provided thumb drive, utilizing their newly acquired skills of file management.

Digital Photography Column

Storage Cards

If you have a digital camera you are also familiar with a memory card – the device that provides the space (storage) for your digital images. The digital camera manufacturers seem to have standardized around the Secure Digital (SD) Card – about 1.25 inches long and 1 inch wide with a corner "cut off". This card is used by most digital camera manufacturers, and because of its wide use, has become the most common, and therefore, least expensive device for digital storage. SONY still uses their "Memory Stick", Olympus and Fuji are still using the XD Picture Card and many of the larger cameras and professional cameras are using a CF memory card which is about 1.5 inches square. Some of the newer cameras have a "double slot" system which allows use of either the SD card *or* another card for memory storage.

The original SD cards came in 8, 16 or 32 MB (MegaBytes) about ten years ago, but because of today's higher resolution cameras, you usually cannot find a memory card with less than 2 GB (GigaBytes) because the modern digital camera takes such large picture files. Many people ask me what they should buy and here's my suggestion. You can buy 16, 32, 64 and even 128 GB cards, but they are very expensive (some over \$100), and although they can store thousands of photos, they eventually slow down the process of your camera finding the picture because there are so many files on the card (like looking in a bookshelf or the Library of Congress for one book). Also, if something happens to a large card and it goes bad (sand or soil, dropping it, finger prints on the gold contacts, etc.) you can lose an entire vacation and have wasted a lot of money!

I recommend carrying two or more 4 GB cards, which should cost you about \$15 per card. The advantage to using smaller cards is less initial expense, not having "all your eggs in one basket – should the card go bad, you've only lost SOME pictures, not ALL, and if you label each card with a number or letter, you are organizing your vacation photos "on the fly" – in other words, as you go through your vacation photos, they should already be organized in two, four or more smaller groups. You should also keep your cards "synched" with the camera that is going to use them; the word is called FORMAT! To find out what that means, and how to do it, you should attend my next "Camera Workshop" on Monday, November 11th at 1pm in the Computer Classroom.

Finger painting has come to the iPad, and not just for your grandkids. One of England's top artists, David Hockney, has opened an exhibit in San Francisco of his artwork created exclusively on an iPad! And it is beautiful! He uses the free app Brushes to create most of his work but there are numerous other painting apps from .99 to 9.99. If Brushes is good enough for Hockney, it should work for you. Give it a try! New iPads

Apple recently announced a new iPad mini and the iPad Air to go on sale soon. Should you consider upgrading? Here are my feelings on this; I have a mini and a generation 3 iPad with retina display and I have trouble telling the difference in the display when I open the same photo on each. The retina has a much higher resolution, but maybe my eye isn't discerning enough, because the photos appear the same to me, on the mini without retina display as on the one with it. So I am sticking with my current mini for now. As for the new Air iPad, it has a faster processor and some other improvements but not enough to make me want to upgrade. If you still have the first generation, or an iPad 2, you may want to consider one of these.

Kretchmar's Korner

Observations on Windows 8.1

Having nothing better to do with 3 hours of my life I went to my start screen in Windows 8, typed "store" and was taken directly to Microsoft's online store where the Windows 8.1 upgrade was the first and most prominently featured app available. This is a HUGE file, about 3.5 GB, but fortunately I have the upgraded Cox broadband so the download itself, on two computers at the same time, took over an hour. The installation process itself took well over an hour, in part because Microsoft forces you to go through a few screens and answer some questions, not unlike you were installing Windows 8 for the first time. If possible, I suggest you do this download through a stable hard wired connection.

I'm going to share just a few of my initial observations regarding Windows 8.1. The changes are not as dramatic as many would have liked, but overall they are worth the effort. This is not intended to be a thorough review of 8.1, just a few first impressions.

You Can Boot to the Desktop!

One of the main complaints with Windows 8 is that Microsoft forced you to boot to the new Start screen, the tiles, instead of letting you boot directly to the desktop as with every recent version of Windows. Most of us are used to starting all of our computer tasks from the desktop environment.

You could work around this in Windows 8 by installing a third party utility program, most of which were designed mainly to restore the missing Start button, which many users missed. Windows 8.1 does not bring back the beloved Start button, but they've made it easier to move on.

With Windows 8.1 you can boot directly to the desktop. It's not immediately apparent how, since Microsoft still doesn't include directions with Windows 8.1. I think this is a mistake, but at least it's easy once you know the steps.

After booting Windows 8.1 the first time, click the Desktop tile to enter Desktop mode. That's how most of us were starting our sessions anyway.

Right-click any open area in the taskbar and click on Properties.

Click on the Navigation tab, and then check the box next to, "When I sign in or close all apps on a screen, go to the desktop instead of Start."

Click OK, then reboot. Windows should boot right into your Desktop.

And it's that simple. If you want to go reverse the process and go back to the Start-screen on booting, just repeat the process and uncheck the box by "Go to the desktop instead of Start when I sign in."

Other Changes

With the release of Windows 8.1, Microsoft has added a Tile button to replace the Start button.

Conceptually providing a Tile button, which takes you directly to the new Start screen, makes a lot of sense. All of the functionality of the old Start button, and plenty more, can be accessed using the new Tiles interface.

The Tiles screen now includes a down arrow in the lower left-hand corner which displays all of your apps. When all of your apps are displayed, the arrow turns up, and a click returns you to your normal start screen.

In the Tiles screen Microsoft has helpfully added a "Help + Tips" tile. This would have saved many of us significant heartburn if it had been included in Windows 8.

A significant change in Windows 8.1 is Microsoft's approach to search. Where it used to be specific and tailored, it's now universal. If you search for "games" in Windows 8.1 it will still show you the app, but now it also shows the Control Panel games settings. The search in Windows 8 could be frustrating since you had to identify the category of your search.

Microsoft has also improved the built-in photos app with new options to use tools like crop, rotate, and additional editing features.

How About a Game of Solitaire?

Most importantly for many, Windows has made it much easier to get a free real Windows game of Solitaire on your system. Simply type "games" anywhere on the tile screen. Click on the Games icon then type "Solitaire" in the Apps search box and select the Windows game of solitaire, (also called Klondike). Select "Play" and the game will be installed on your system.

The new game looks and plays better than ever and the sound and visuals when you win are awesome!
