Tom's Tech-Notes

Computer Club Facilities Plans for 2014

Since we're not having a January general meeting and not having my usual "State of the Club" live presentation, I thought I'd use this space to comment on some of the key facilities plans for the upcoming year. The Board has placed these items in the 2014 budget and we'll begin implementing them once the membership has approved the budget at our February 6th Business Meeting.

Projection System upgrades:

- We plan to upgrade the classroom projector to a full HD (1080P) system. This will improve the brightness and readability of projected presentations.
- The current classroom projector will be moved to the instruction lab. It projects a wide-screen 720P image which will be a much better fit for presenting Windows 8 training classes.
- To support the wide-screen projection in the lab, we will install a new 150 inch diagonal screen.
- The current lab projector will be moved to the Club's media cart at Desert Vista and used for our general meeting presentations.

Network Upgrades:

- We plan to upgrade our primary router to a dual-band (N600) unit. This will support more simultaneous connections – especially from tablets.
- We are exploring adding a second Internet connection, with its own separate wireless router, as a way to increase our total Internet access capacity. The likely provider is CenturyLink, but details have yet to be worked out.

Monitor Replacements in the Lab:

- The current student 20 inch widescreen monitors are nearing 5 years old. We plan to replace them with 13 similar touchscreen monitors. The touchscreens don't need Plexiglas screen protectors and can be cleaned. The PC training systems will still have keyboards and mice, so that the systems can be used either way in classes and open lab sessions.

New iMac for the Lab:

- In the id-summer time-frame, we plan to acquire one additional 21 inch Apple iMac for the lab to replace an older unit with a small screen.

The complete 2014 Computer Club budget will be available on the www.scs-cc.com website once it has final approval by the 2014 Board at the January 8th Board meeting.

The "State of the Club - 2014" presentation handouts will be posted on the website in early January for your reading pleasure.

Boot Camp Course Description:

Boot Camp is an introductory course designed for residents who are new to computing and/or the Microsoft Windows operating system. **It also serves as an excellent review for intermediate users who want to fill some gaps in their computer knowledge.**

This hands-on class has a **limited enrollment of 12** with each participant working at an individual computer station in the Computer Lab. A multi-member team of lead instructor and three coaches will provide step-by-step instruction that will include demonstrations, guided practice and individual coaching assistance.

Participants will be introduced to the basic vocabulary and concepts necessary to establish an understanding of Windows. They will be instructed in practical techniques for managing and organizing their own data files, will be introduced to important strategies for working successfully with word processing documents, email, and the Internet, and will learn how to read and write data from and to a portable flash drive. Those participants who own a digital camera will be invited to actively participate in a hands-on experience of copying photos from their camera to their provided thumb drive, utilizing their newly acquired skills of file management.

But it's FREE!

It seems that all of us are always looking for something to download from the Internet. We all want "FREE" stuff! Well, we all must be careful and be conscious of what we're doing.

First, ALWAYS download from the "company site"! if you've never heard of the place and stumbled across a "little jewel", remember NOTHIN' AIN'T FREE. (You live in Las Vegas). These downloads come with many little "extras" which cause havoc with your PC.

Second, when downloading, EVEN from a reliable site, always look for "Custom or Express" and TAKE THE CUSTOM! If you select EXPRESS, which you are often "recommended" to do, you don't know what you are downloading and can often take some adware, malware, or what's worse, a virus.

If you select CUSTOM, a list of items in the "package" you are about to download, will be presented and you CAN select which items you specifically want. LOOK AT THOSE LITTLE BOXES and make sure ONLY THE ITEM YOU WANT IS CHECKED!

You don't want a "free trial to the Pro version," because, then in thirty days you'll be asked for money.

You DON'T want a "FREE TOOLBAR" because you already have enough!

You DON'T want to make this browser or that search engine become your DEFAULT!

Please be careful when downloading anything and READ what is on the screen. Don't ASSUME anything!

Also, there is good FREE stuff, but a version of Malware Bytes Pro usually costs only \$12, and it's worth it. Finally, remember, what you get is what you pay for. I've been using a subscription anti-virus "protect the Internet" thingie for years (from Webroot) and it only costs me about \$20 for each of my computers. It's worth it!

We live in Las Vegas and every day I hear, "But it's FREE!" NO IT'S NOT! How much did that Rampart T-shirt you're wearing cost?

iPad News and Tips

iPad Manuals

I have covered this before, but with new users tuning in, it's time to talk about iPad manuals. Several years ago when you bought a new device of any kind, it always came with a nice instruction manual, but as you know, when you buy anything today, you are on your own. Fortunately, there are manuals for most devices available online, and the iPad is no exception. One thing you need to check before downloading a manual is the publication date. The upgrade to iOS 7 made older iPad manuals virtually obsolete, as the new system changed so many features. (I am assuming that you have all upgraded to the new operating system.)

Since iOS 7 was introduced in September, most manuals published before that date would not be worth downloading. Fortunately, most of the manuals covering the new system use iOS 7 as part of the title so it is easy to find a current manual.

Here are a couple of places to find a manual:

The first is from Apple and is available for download at this URL:

manuals.info.apple.com/en_US/iPad_User_Guide.pdf

The other place is through the iBooks app. You will need to first download this app from the App Store. After you open it, you will see store listed in the upper left corner. Open the store and then type in iPad in the search box in the upper right corner. You will find several manuals, some free, that you can download to iBooks.

Finally, if the manual still doesn't answer your question, you can always go to Google. I find myself often using Google instead of trying to find the answer in a manual.

Kretchmar's Korner

My First Windows 8 Infection

I have been saying for almost a year that I have never removed a virus from a Windows 8 computer. I can't say that any longer, although I still believe Windows 8 / 8.1 is far more secure than any previous versions of Windows.

The malware that snuck on to the computer club member's PC was named SmartPC, but I'm sure this same malware will manifest itself under any number of names. I suspect the infection renames itself frequently, since none of the usual computer cleaning tools I use, such as (freshly updated) MalwareBytes, SuperAntiSpyware, Spybot, and Avast identified the program as malware.

The infection did not act like any malware I've encountered, so the heuristic feature of virus prevention and detection were ineffective. Heuristic analysis operates based on past experience (by comparing the suspicious file to the code and functions of known viruses) it is likely to miss new viruses that contain previously unknown methods of operating not found in any known viruses.

The infection was a form of ransom-ware. Whenever the user opened her Internet browser, Google Chrome in this case, a popup window would appear and act like it was scanning her system and finding a lot of malware. The window could not be closed, so the computer became difficult to use.

The malware was not triggered when the user opened Internet Explorer, so that was a temporary work around that allowed the user to access her Gmail account. I suspect this or similar malware could have just as easily associated itself with Internet Explorer or any other browser.

Remarkably, the malware appeared just like any legitimate program when I opened Task Manager! I was then able to see via Properties that the malware executable file was installed in the Programs Folder.

I checked MSCONFIG and saw the rogue program starting in both Services and Startup.

After unchecking the calls to the malware from the system configuration, I manually deleted the relevant files from the programs folder.

I made a backup copy of the registry, just to be safe, after executing REGEDIT. I then manually removed every reference to the malware program from the registry. This was the most tedious aspect of ridding the computer of the infection. Not every reference could be deleted, but in

those instances I was able to change the associated Data Value to 0 (zero), effectively nullifying any mischief that entry might have triggered.

I have used a similar technique to remove this type of malware from a Windows 7 system, but in that case the popup started as soon as the system booted to the desktop. To me this reinforces the Microsoft's claim that the root of the Windows 8/8.1 operating system is more secure than in prior versions of Windows.

There is a commercially available product named SmartPC that promises to fix all or your computer troubles for \$29.95. I doubt the malware I removed had any connection with that product, because similar products I've tested were fairly easy to remove. However I believe most if not all of these software programs, many advertised on TV, promise much more than they can possibly deliver.

Viruses are obviously evolving faster than our security suites ability to prevent or remove them, so regular system and/or data backups are the only real protection from disaster.
